Their letter summarised their five month trip up north following Joe's retirement. They left Yarrawonga on 16th July and followed a route mapped out for them by Bob & Merle Crawford, eventually joining them (the Crawfords) at Oasis Caravan Park at Palm Cove, 26 kms north of Cairns. They intended staying 2 weeks but this extended to 7 weeks and 4 days. The four of them travelled all round the area visiting places like Port Douglas, Daintree, Herberton, Wongabel, Lake Eachan, Lake Barrine, Milanda Falls, Atherton War Cemetery. Dear Ron,

It's hard to believe that its nearly a year since we were together on Anzac day. As mentioned on the telephone Ron Vernon died some months ago and in January Harold Mollison. Ron had lived in Wagga Wagga since about 1970 and will be remembered by many. He joined us in April 1943 at Oro Bay with his brother Gerald who lives in Sydney. Ron had a narrow escape during an air raid at Dreger Harbour in February 1944.

It was indeed a privilege to be amongst those from the 10th, as well as many others, to be at Benalla for the service and funeral of Harold. Those present from the 10th were Stan Lucas, Alec Murphy, Doug Potter, Doug McLerie, Horrie Hamer and myself.

Mrs Mollison was greatly sustained and the personal tributes expressed by so many could only confirm what was true of such a wonderful person as Harold.

Last August my wife Margaret and I went to North Queensland for a holiday. At Port Douglas we were about to board a boat for the Outer Reef when I heard someone say "I should know you". Turning around it was Joe Strudwick and his

wife. As they had tickets for another boat we joined them and had a most enjoyable trip to Low Isle.

They told us that they were staying at the Oasis Caravan Park and that Bob and Merle Crawford were there too. Unexpectedly we met one of my sisters and her husband and surprisingly when we mentioned Bob and Merle they wondered if they were the Bob and Merle they knew.
