Anyhow nobody sent papers of where you were although I was sick of War. I doubt if I could march far now because of Asthma which I got through the beloved cigarettes so I suppose if I send this and hope the P.M.G. will find you.

A strange thing has happened to me over the past couple of months. On Channel 10 they have been filming stories. The first was The riddle of the Stinson. About Bernard O'Riley. I met that gentleman and he told me the story at the bar of his "Beaudesert Hotel". The unit was camped at the end of the 4ft 8inch railway line. I think it was called "Jimboomba". About 14 miles from Beaudesert. 7 Division had issued an order for local leave passes the "motor train" to "Beaudesert" had already gone back up the line for the day. Col. McKenzie told us to wear Red Cross armbands. He didn't know we had rang Beau and ordered a taxi to pick us up. The driver showed us first the "Grand" (which was a tired weather-board building on 10ft legs) then the "new one". The Beaudesert. O'Riley told me he had received a grant of money (I forget how much and who had supplied it) but it was enough to build the pub. On walking the streets later on the troops who had no leave passes were fooled by the white armbands and vanished down side streets.

The second film was of Damion Parer and you know of his visits. The first being at our first camp at Buna.

We were half way thru a job. Picking little bits of lead and copper out of a bloke's stomach when a buzzing noise started near my left ear-hole. Major Yeats said "Don't look around. We are making history. That's a movie camera". Damion Parer was using my bare back so the actual operation wouldn't be seen. I had quite a yarn to him later. His knowledge of the fighting in N.G. was enormous. Incidentally I saw that film much later when we were at Lae. Back and all.

The next film was just recently "Darwin" Doctor Keith Bowden. I first met Keith when I was about 16 years old. I used to go to a Gym at Scots Church Hall in Heidelberg. The minister's son was doing a Divinity course at Melb. Uni. and Keith was doing the same. After climbing ropes and parallel bars we would build pyramids.

The two (I don't remember the parsons son's name) finished at the Uni. They went to India as Missionaries under the Presbyterian Missionary scheme. Keith came back after twelve months. He said what the people needed was Doctors. So back to the Uni to learn to be a Doc. Then back to India for I think four years. After that he did a spell becoming a Surgeon. Some time later he was assistant to the Coroner at the Melbourne Morgue.

My older brother saw him now and then. My next sight of Keith Bowden was early in the film "Surgeon Commander Bowden", so he apparently joined the Navy. Archie (my brother), a bee-keeper by trade, joined the Navy but only got about 10 miles north of Brisbane. His main job was the boom gates in the Brisbane river. Open the boom in the morning and come down at dusk and shut them again.

In the Weekend Australian Sept. 24 - 25, there was an article "The Men Who Made it Home". This was the Air Force bods who were part of Gull Force in the Ambon Islands. 250 of this Force were killed by the Nips. A group of survivors met in Sydney after 46 years to get to know one another again. Remarkable isn't it?
