We are constantly being reminded of the passage of time and anniversaries seem to take on a greater significance as we grow older. This year represents a "MILESTONE IN MEMORIES" as it is 50 years since the unit 'became of age'.

1942 was a year which brought great changes to our lives and provided a wide spectrum of emotions ranging from boredom through excitement, fear, satisfaction and unit pride. Mateship was a strong and important element in our lives then and is re-kindled at our reunions. Make the 50th anniversary an incentive to join in our 47th Reunion on Anzac Day 1992 - Saturday 25/4/92.

Here are a few memories of 1942

- MAY: The unit moved to JIMBOOMBA amid talk of the 'Brisbane Line'
- OCTOBER: Unit transferred to 1st Aust. Corps.
Received reinforcements from 4th Field Ambulance.
Placed under embarkation orders and sailed for NEW GUINEA on 29th on S.S. "BOTH" and S.S. "MAETSUYCKER" (with a forced stop at Townsville).
- NOVEMBER: Reached Port Moresby where new C.O. Lt. Col. PALMER joined us (and route marches began!).
Joined by reinforcements from 22nd Field Ambulance.
Finally disembarked on 28th and moved to 2/9 A.G.H.
- DECEMBER: On 18th the first detachment of the unit "Went into action" at BUNA.

THE MARCH It seems that 9.00 A.M. has become the regular starting time now. This year the Army is between Navy and R.A.A.F. which means a slightly earlier start for us.

I received some light hearted admonishment from our President last year when we moved off at 10.05 A.M. against my estimated time of 10.15 A.M.; so as a conservative estimate we should assemble this year at about 9.45 a.m. Our starting point is the same spot in Collins St. ie between Swanston and Elizabeth Sts. where Kruger Kings' grandsons will again be carrying the banner. For those watching on T.V. the two units scheduled to march in front of us are the 2/4 A.G.H. followed by the 2/7 AGH. Only 28 members marched last year against 46 in 1990 - lets aim for 50 members marching this year to celebrate 50 years since our first route march in Port Moresby! We took only 32 minutes to complete the march last year which means an earlier start to our Reunion gathering.

Last years' Reunion An enthusiastic 46 members attended including interstaters BOB JAMES and WAL PAGE. The earlier start enabled us to start the meeting before lunch, which as usual was first class.

TOAST TO THE UNIT was proposed by JACK ALLEN in a most entertaining and sincere manner along these lines,
"I must admit that I feel somewhat of an imposter here, as my service with the 10th Australian Field Ambulance was relatively short, compared to some of you.

Nevertheless, 50 years ago next August was when I first made contact with the unit, as together with a number of other recruits, we lined up on the parade ground at Nagambie Road, Seymour, confronted by Colonel MacKenzie, flanked by what was up until then, a mere handful of men who comprised the unit. From that moment onwards, our lives were inexorably changed, we were moulded in with the existing skeleton, to flesh out the body, and so bring it up to something like full strength for the first time in the Second World War. The welcoming speech delivered by Colonel MacKenzie had to be heard to be believed, and was surpassed only by another which he delivered a couple of weeks later before we went on our first leave.

During the next few weeks we were to experience many new things, being drilled, lectured, kitted out, injected, blood grouped and marched about the district so becoming closely acquainted with such local

geographical features as Hughes Creek, the Gravel Pits, Donga No.2 and Guilds Hill. We attended church parades, camp concerts, sick parades, short arm inspections, and got lost on night manoeuvres. We discovered such things as Thomas Splints, and some of us, the significant few, learned a bit about how to handle Lee Enfield 303's and heavy vehicles. We sampled new taste sensations from the kitchen, one of which still sticks in my memory, and probably still in the intestines of some of us, its adhesive powers being only to that of Supa Glue, for it defied Newton's law of gravity, steadfastly refusing to fall to earth from a plate held upside down. All of this was of course, part of the training process, and apparently worked with remarkable success, in the light of later events.

And then, picking up more recruits we were on our way, firstly on foot, then by rail, and then by sea. I fell ill at Oro Bay, was flown over to the 2/9th AGH at Port Moresby, and from there by hospital ship Manunda to RGH Heidelberg. According to my official records, I spent 299 days in hospital, with further stints convalescing at Stonnington and Ballarat.

During this period, I met with many other patients, most of whom had been always keen for news of my old unit's doings, I did what would no doubt these days be called "doing a survey", by asking those who passed through your hands, how they were treated.

I am both pleased and proud to be able to pass on to you the results of this survey. Of all those to whom I addressed myself, which was a considerable number, not ONE had anything derogatory to say about the treatment, both medical and physical, received at your hands, many in fact, speaking in quite glowing terms of the treatment received. So, gentlemen, the 10th Australian Field Ambulance stood tall in the eyes of its associates, and there is no greater accolade than to be accepted and respected by your peers."

President Mick thanked Jack on behalf of all members and then entertained us with reminiscences of his time with the unit. The meeting then heard brief reports from JACK BACON covering welfare, BOB KING - Social and VERN LAIDLAN on our financial situation.

A donation of \$100 was again made to Legacy a most worthy cause. Under the heading of general business news of some of our members was received. VERN LAIDLAW, who goes out of his way to contact members reported on having seen SYD BIFFEN, STAN LUCAS and DON LUDLUM. We also learnt that MERV BLOW moved to Queensland.

THE AFTERS BOB and MARJ KING again invite members to the traditional gathering at their home as an extension of the reunion.

LEST WE FORGET During the year we heard of the deaths of three of our members: DR. GAVIN JOHNSON, AUB. VIMPANI and JIM LOVERIDGE and we mourn their passing.

I write with sadness to advise the passing away of my father during the early hours of Sunday 1st December 1991 aged 83 years. Dad was admitted to the Repatriation Hospital at Heidelberg on 19th July 1991 suffering from several complaints and after a three week stay moved onto the Macleod Repatriation Hospital for a further three weeks. He was allowed home on

Wednesday 28th August 1991 however it was found that he was having difficulties and he was readmitted to Macleod Repatriation Hospital on 2nd September 1991 where he stayed until his death on 1st December 1991.

I know that for many years my father had not attended any of the reunions or kept in contact with anybody from the unit however, he did keep every piece of correspondence that was received. Unfortunately after the death of my mother in January 1958 my father never remarried and just seemed to shut himself off from family friends and relatives. However such is life and one of his greatest prides on Earth was serving for Australia in the 10th Field Ambulance.

I received your letter about a week ago but at my age I haven't had time to answer till now. I was born on 13 July 1915 so you can work out that in a few months I will be 77 years of age. I have spent this last month making arrangements for my funeral pre-paid. Before Xmas I had a meeting with the Funeral Parlour approved by the Army. The service will be held at Montmorency Presbyterian Church, and the nearest grave yard is at Kangaroo Ground. My health has been very bad over the last five years and I have been waiting six months for an urgent operation at Repat. Heidelberg. I saw on T.V. a suggestion to place a small plaque on the grave of a service-man listing service details.

At Mangalore we had a Blue Heeler dog who had adopted us. I taught him to jump for a stick held out at shoulder height. One day COL. McKENZIE was going crook about fellows going A.W.L. He got a bit worked up and started to wave his cane around. Bluey sat up, then went like a rocket for the stick. He made a beaut jump and took the cane out of McKENZIES' hand. Bluey raced back and put the stick on the ground on my right then sat at attention next to me. McKENZIE would not believe that he belonged to the Army and not just to me. Well thats all please come and see me anytime.

Our trek from BUNA to POPPENDETTA; foot-sore caused by uneven terrain, swampy, intermittent corduroy tracks to avoid bogging, will long be remembered. Both of us with dysentery, very homesick with sore bottoms, would have thrown in the towel had the then Sgt. JACK MCGILL not urged us along. On reaching an R.A.P. we were given medication which tasted like Epsom Salts. If we thought we were crook before, it was nothing to what was to come from this purgative. Some of the boys perhaps remember the motor-bike lying beside the track, but like us you probably thought it useless. A team of horses would not have pulled TED DONOVAN past it, so eventually 'good old sarge' let us try it. One kick, maybe two, and we were away. We thought we had won TATTS, I never thought one bike could carry so many packs rifles etc. and two blokes with their bums on fire. We followed the track until we reached our destination and collapsed under a coconut tree and waited for the rest to arrive. The bike was later retrieved by rightful owners. As a result of the awesome cacophony of noises from the battered exhaust it was rumoured that TOKYO ROSE mentioned there was a secret fast firing weapon, manned by two diggers, along the BUNA track.

After service at Wangaratta Training Camp then to Canungra Jungle Training Camp I, along with JOCK ROE and many others were in train for TOWNSVILLE from where we joined the Troop Ship DUNTROON which was to take us to NEW GUINEA. I was allocated a space down the hold in the steerage section near the huge engines where the temperature was unbearable. To cheer us up a sailor told us it would be the target where torpedoes are usually aimed. Five or six hours out from Townsville we were ordered up on deck for boat emergency drill after which the bilge pumps poured out beautiful cool water from the Coral Sea. This was a revelation after the oppressive heat down below. After a 'sub' scare or two we reached Port Moresby and the poor old 'CHOCO' once more missed out on some of the privileges. I was told to sleep under the eaves of an Army Hut. I remember waking up early as "Sewing Machine Charlie" paid us a visit. We eventually arrived at ORO BAY and 10th Field Ambulance.
