Anzac Day is on a Sunday this year and we are hoping this may mean that more members will be able to attend. Interstate attendances should be higher and we have heard that these will include DR. BILL BRAND. Once again the Committee has decided to keep the cost of the luncheon to \$15, the balance to be subsidised from unit funds.

At last years' reunion VERN LAIDLAW proposed that members sons and grandsons over 18 years of age should be allowed to accompany the member to the Reunion. After much discussion this was agreed to. Members who wish to take advantage of this must contact VERN at least one week before the Reunion and limited acceptances will be granted on the 'first come first served' basis. Because we are bound to pay for the minimum number of luncheons ordered, payment in advance for these visitors is requested.

- THE MARCH On ringing Anzac House for details of this years' March I was put through to one of the Marshalls who announced in parade-ground style that the commencement time was again '0900 hours'. As the Army is leading we are in for an early start and should be ready to move off from our normal spot in Collins St. between Swanston and Elizabeth Sts. no later than 9.15 AM NOT A PROBLEM!
- LAST YEAR We managed to muster 37 marchers in ideal conditions. Two of BOB KINGS grandsons BRADLEY and JUSTIN again carried the banner assisted by their brother THOMAS and WATTIE TULLY'S grandson DEAN FALLON on the side ropes.

President MICK DUNN led us off at 9.45 AM and 36 enjoyable minutes later we passed the saluting point at the Shrine.

LAST YEAR'S REUNION We fell only one short of having 50 members at our '50 years since first action' luncheon. The number however was achieved when VERN LAIDLAW'S son RUSSELL joined us. The memorabilia and photos were a great source of interest and the general atmosphere seemed to roll back the years.

The Secretary and Assistant Secretary shared the reading of the names of our deceased members who were remembered during the traditional 2 minutes silence. President MICK later said "As the list is read many of us can catch a fleeting glimpse of them in our minds eye - a very moving experience."

were received from LLOYD STUART, DR. BILL BRAND, KEN GORDON, GEOFF FLOWER, ANDY McHATTIE, HAROLD GRUNDY, WALLY PAGE, ED MOTT, ALLEN GADSDEN and DR. EMMET SPRING.

- INTERSTATE MEMBERS BOB JAMES, MURDOCH McMILLAN and KEITH HALL (MERIMBULA) were given the usual warm welcome.
- TOAST TO THE UNIT

  One of the highlights of the Reunion was the witty,
  nostalgic and informative Toast presented by DR. IAN WILSON. We
  were made privy to some events which occurred behind the scenes;
  history previously untold and therefore quite absorbing. Older members
  in particular enjoyed his memories of the earlier days when IAN was
  2.I.C. at NAGAMBIE ROAD CAMP. He recalled GEOFF DERMER
  chasing and actually catching a rabbit. BULL MARTIN in full battle
  dress taking CHURCH PARADE. Being issued with a .45 revolver
  which was so inaccurate and ineffective that on reaching NEW
  GUINEA he managed to swap it for a TOMMY GUN. Also being
  given BULLY BEEF to eat which was found to be left over from World
  War 1, but which was "good and tasty". IAN told of his love-hate

relationship with 'the old man' LT. COL. McKENZIE. 'MAC' had accused the Officers of being sissies when they complained that there was too much chlorine in the water, so they put increasing drops of chlorine in his tea over a couple of days to try and prove their point. 'MAC' woke up to what was going on exclaiming "You young B.....s I'll get you for this". True enough he stopped their leave for some time. When the 'old man' was 'captured' early in the 'battle of MT. TAMBORINE' IAN and MERV FEATONBY decided to take advantage of his temporary absence and set up an aid-post at Southport!

IAN revealed how concerned he and other Officers became over MAC'S increasing instability as the unit was preparing for the inevitable action to come. He likened the position to that in the CAINE MUTINY. The situation was resolved when MAC became ill and was replaced. Episodes of the move to NEW GUINEA were related. TOWNSVILLE of course was mentioned, one reference being to the sewage which flowed out of the Harbour with the tide, then back again on the change of tide. IAN found it much better to watch the beautiful sunsets than the sewage!

Sometime when the Unit was variously at BUNA, GONA and/or SANANANDA he was temporarily attached to an INFANTRY unit. At one stage he found himself alone and struggling to carry a heavy pack of medical equipment when a JEEP bearing no less a person than GENERAL GEORGE VASEY gave him a lift.

In 1943 IAN was laid low with SCRUB TYPHUS which in three weeks reduced his weight by seven stone. He remembers LAURIE MALKIN telling him he was 'with the fairies' on occasions. He praised the treatment he received, reminding us that the 10th had the best record of any unit for the nursing of SCRUB TYPHUS patients and he acknowledged with emotion that his life had been saved by the boys whom he had helped to train. IAN was given a standing ovation at the conclusion of his TOAST.

- RESPONSE President MICK thanked IAN for his excellent TOAST and said that he shared the sentiments expressed. Each year MICK passes on to the meeting a few well chosen thoughts which add greatly to the dignity of the occasion and endears him further to members. Later in the meeting he paid tribute to the late DR. GAVAN JOHNSON decorated for services to the 10th and later to a C.C.S. and commented that GAVAN lived and ordered his life as a Christian.
- NEWS OF ABSENT MEMBERS Various members gave brief reports on the following MERV. BLOW, CHARLIE REDDINGS, BERT WEBSTER, KEN GORDON, BRUCE YOUNG, KEITH FLINTOFF, DANNY BISHOP, ROD BOUNDY, EARL AND NED MATTHEWS and ROY DE JARLAIS.
- SOCIAL CLUB REPORT was given by WATTIE TULLY who mentioned both the successful picnic and YARRAWONGA TRIP. WATTIE moved and BOB JAMES seconded the motion that \$100 be again made available towards a trip to assist widows who go to YARRAWONGA.
- WELFARE REPORT JACK BACON advised that SYD BIFFEN died on 21st April after about eight months of cancer. JACK advised that all of us should be medically examined every three months to avoid an autopsy being required in the case of sudden death. He raised the question of death notices in the press and after full discussion it was agreed that this be left in his capable hands.

TREASURERS REPORT VERN LAIDLAW reported a credit of \$466.98 in the current account and \$2,744.65 in the Investment account. Both accounts had been audited by LAURIE MALKIN.

The meeting officially closed at 2.55 P.M. at which time TED YOUNG showed a series of wartime slides of members which once again brought great delight.

I believe that "the afters" at the home of BOB and MARG KING was again a great success and will be 'on again' this year.

LEST WE FORGET We add three names to last years' list and mourn the passing of SYD BIFFEN 20/4/92, HAROLD (TAC) GRUNDY 3/5/92 and HARRY (SHAGGY) WILLIAMS 9/11/92.

Neil Gerrand wrote to SYD'S widow and received a lovely reply and copy of the funeral service. This will be on display at the reunion along with the oration delivered so well by TED YOUNG at the funeral of TAC GRUNDY. I learnt of the death of HARRY WILLIAMS from the 4th FLD AMB. Newsletter.

Thanks for such a newsy letter Ken. Saw 'Blood Oath' and agree with your comments. I thought they might at least have shown the 'Squat' latrines!

It is unlikely that I will be able to attend the March, and the dinner on Anzac Day.

My wife has recently undergone a severe operation and I am restricted, not only because of the location of the village, but the orthopaedic specialist states that my spine is a mess, and he is unable to operate without causing more damage.

Thought I would send a couple of stories which may be of interest, whilst the unit was camped near Maryborough, Q'ld. Would you be good enough to pass on my best wishes to all who will be present at the dinner. I regret not meeting with old friends on that day.

I would mention, at this stage I was the only officer in "A" Coy, whose area was some distance from H.Q. and "B" Coy, which suited us.

#### The first aid demo.

I was ordered to prepare a squad to put on a demonstration of first aid, in the town. Unfortunately, I am unable, with the exception of Kel White, to remember the names of the boys who were members of that squad. I am sure someone will help.

We practiced for some time then proceeded to the Maryborough Town Hall, and put on the demonstration before a gathering of various interested groups - Red Cross, St. John Ambulance, hospital workers, fire brigade, V.D.C. etc. It was well received and written up in quite glowing terms in the local paper the following week. We showed the application of the Thomas splint and also a method of using a stretcher with the carry straps to provide tension for fractures. This latter method was rather crude, and I doubt that it was ever used in practice.

The nicest part of the evening was the lavish supper which was provided by the ladies auxilliary and thoroughly enjoyed. I would mention that, afterwards I was invited by two members of the V.D.C. to accompany them. I found myself in the back room of a rather sleazy pub, where the hosts produced a bottle of rum and a large jug of beer and proceeded to down the rum and beer chasers, this looked dangerous and it was only some quick talking that I managed to get away, using the excuse that the ambulance was waiting to take us back to camp and there would be serious trouble if we were late. (It was nothing to the trouble if I had stayed with those two characters).

# The railway crossing exercise

It was decided to hold a surprise exercise to test the unit's ability to cope with an emergency, and felt the railway crossing would be a suitable venue.

I was detailed to provide the victims and proceeded to write down all the horrific injuries I could think of (fractures galore, limbs torn off etc.) these were on paper and pinned to the selected victims who were spread along the

railway line. The alarm was given and in due course the ambulances with crews arrived. I can still vividly remember the mighty leap of Capt. McFarlane, he cleared the post and rail fence in his eagerness to get to the casualties. The rescuers were greeted by their grinning mates who offered helpful advice as to their treatment. I think that some of the treatment they received was a little rougher than would normally be given.

However, they were duly sent on to H.Q. for processing etc. I understand the exercise was classed as a success.

### The "A" Coy picquet scam.

In the evenings, after mess at H.Q. I would return to the Coy area, and call in for a chat with RON SINCOCK, whose tent was near mine. Was puzzled that RON seemed to be on picquet duty quite often and later became a bit suspicious, much later learned that it was a ploy to keep me out of the way and in ignorance.

It seemed that in keeping with "A" Coy initiative and ingenuity, the boys had "put in" and bought an alarm clock, thus obviating necessity for night picquets (all contrary to good order and military discipline!)

It meant that the alarm was set for the proper time, so that the fires were lit, the cooks woken, and breakfast produced on time and all had an undisturbed night.

Someone who has an intimate knowledge of this enterprise may care to enlighten us further!!
