We assemble in the same place as last year, ie. in FLINDERS STREET near the corner of RUSSELL STREET at 9.30am ready for a 9.40am start.
Our position in the march is with other units of 1st Australian Corps at the Head of World War 2 Troops and we have a 'Mini' Reunion whilst waiting to set off.

REPORT ON ANZAC DAY 1997

THE MARCH

You may remember that only 25 members marched in 1996 so it was pleasing to have 31 march in 1997. Perhaps, with the passing years we will not reach 40 again - now there's a challenge!

The weather was fine and sunny, the start somewhat later at 9.50am, but in 33 minutes we reached the SHRINE, 4 minutes earlier than '96. (We live in the age of statistics!)

Our two sprightly leaders were President MICK DUNN and ALEC REITH. Again our unit Banner was proudly carried by a team of "unit grandchildren".

THE REUNION

With 72 members and guests attending it seems safe to say that the success of this reunion has established the pattern for future years. President MICK DUNN opened proceedings at 11.30am with a few well chosen words of welcome and called on ALEC REITH to propose the LOYAL TOAST. Then followed the solemn ritual, firstly President MICK called on all to stand for the traditional 2 minutes of silence. This was followed by the sounding of the LAST POST and with members still standing the secretary DICK HOLMES and assistant secretary KEN STANLEY shared the reading of our HONOUR ROLL of 154 deceased members followed by LEST WE FORGET.

APOLOGIES

Apologies were received from BERT CAPES, BRUCE YOUNG, RON HANDLEY, WALLY PAGE, JOHN COX, GEOFF FLOWER, NEIL GERRAND and Dr. MALCOM MCKENZIE. A WELCOME was extended to our only interstate member JOHN STANDERWICK and his son JOHN and a special welcome to Dr. COLIN COPELAND who usually attends his battalion reunion.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Our treasurer VERN LAIDLAW advised that we had \$3,348.08 invested which was earning a modest 3.25%, plus cash in hand of \$1,349.64 from which the reunion costs were to be met. Of course more money was received on the day.

10th TIT BITS

RON WOFF reported that 121 copies were sent out to members and widows. The copy sent to BOB ROUGHAN was returned marked "DECEASED".

TOAST TO THE UNIT

ALAN PATRICK proposed this toast with a combination of humour and solemnity. He recalled his early days in 'BOYSTOWN' at NAGAMBIE ROAD - no floorboards, no palliasses, small drains around tents which were useless when it rained. He was pleased when COLONEL MCKENZIE hand picked him and others for the 10th and remembers being introduced to "GENTLEMAN" HAROLD MOLLISON who helped him to settle into a "CLUB AWAY FROM HOME".

At WONGABEL our giant cook, Corporal JACK WALSH, introduced him to boxing and nicknamed him 'Vic' after the famous boxer. Alan was relieved when this rather uneven boxing partnership terminated. He recalled the yacht which he and EDDIE MOTT made at BALIKPAPAN. The sails were fashioned from hospital sheets and sewn up by RAY FRITH. On leaving BALIKPAPAN he was forced to accept a poor price for the yacht but it had provided a lot of fun.

Then to AMBON where BADMINTON, CRICKET and SWIMMING occupied his spare time. At AMBON he met up with a workmate who had been in the 2nd/21 Battalion, a member of the GULL FORCE, but had managed to escape to New Guinea. This mate made him a special spear with which he caught quite a few fish.

The history of the GULL FORCE greatly interested ALAN and he listed quite a few books which he recommended for reading. ALAN found that MATESHIP meant that one did not have to cope with hardships of life alone. He felt that the mateship which prevailed in the 10th had helped all of us throughout our lives.

PRESIDENTS RESPONSE

MICK DUNN thanked ALAN for the toast which we all honoured. He said that the mention of BALIKPAPAN recalled to him the early days there before slit trenches were dug, but this was soon remedied after a close call in an air raid.

He also recalled a highly secret message he received at DREGER HARBOUR stating that the 10th were not to handle one of the patients being evacuated by air. Mick was called to the plane and found the patient to be a pregnant SISTER who required a urine bottle - the secret was out!

I don't know whether this had any bearing on his other recollection of the old army golden rule - never volunteer, then you can't be blamed!!

WELFARE REPORT

Jack Bacon reported on the "sickies" and again requested that the committee be advised of the illness of any member.

LEGACY

It has been our practice for many years now to make an annual donation to Legacy mainly because our own funds are not sufficient to give financial assistance to members. MERV FEATONBY moved that our usual donation of \$100 be again made and this was agreed.

WIDOWS OF DECEASED MEMBERS

It was decided that widows of deceased members be permitted to bring one family members with them to the reunion.

SOCIAL COMMITTEE

WATTIE TULLY reported on the annual YARRAWONGA trip last October. Numbers were down but enthusiasm remained and the event is to continue with the help of the usual \$100 donation to assist widows with the cost of transportation. Anyone who would like to go should contact WATTIE or TED YOUNG. Because of lack of support the unit picnic will no longer be held.

1996 ANZAC CEREMONIES AT AMBON

DAVID JAMES gave a very interesting report on his trip to AMBON which covered ceremonies held in three locations over three days.

Two days prior to Anzac Day a service was held at LAHA. At this site, very soon after surrendering to the Japs, about 150 GULL FORCE members were murdered and buried in a mass grave.

Then in the early morning of ANZAC Day a service lasting about 3/4 hour was held at the Commonwealth War Cemetery which has approximately 1200 graves and which is on the site of the infamous P.O.W. Camp. All branches of the Service were represented and a RAAF Padre translated the ceremony which was in Indonesian. Heavy rain fell throughout.

This was followed later in the day by a service at the Australian memorial at KUDAMATI near the site of BILL DOOLAN'S historic stand against the Japs. We remember that the Ambonese composed a song telling of his bravery. This memorial is near the site of our hospital. Some of the notables who attended were the Australian Ambassador and the Mayor and Mayoress of Darwin, with which a twin city relationship exists. The police convoy provided for VIP's was especially welcome because of the continuing rain. David found these experiences particularly worthwhile and we thank him for sharing them with us.

The reunion officially concluded at 2.45pm but the fraternization continued for some time.

In the 1972 Tenth Tit-Bits Kel White called for contributions from every member of an anecdote, incident or experience with a view to forming them into a unit history.

In the 1973 issue he reported that the response had been very poor with only five members responding. The committee discussed the situation at their meeting on 22nd of March 1973 and decided that rather than abandon the project that it be kept alive and they would call for volunteers to compile the history from the substantial quantity of information already available to the Association.

Belatedly I decided last year to volunteer to tackle the job. Firstly I obtained the material held by the Association from Allan Sharp. I was impressed on sorting through the file at the amount of information that had been collected and the preparation for its compilation done by Kel and his helpers even down to suggested chapter headings and content. A precis had been made of all the unit's war diaries, newspaper clippings and New Guinea campaigns.

Working on the above information and putting it into the context of the overall history of the war and adding extracts from letters published in Tenth Tit-Bits I have come up with a first draft consisting of 8 chapters taking us to the point where we went on leave in 1944. It just remains to have this initial draft printed and copied and I would hope to have a copy to you to peruse within the next fortnight. I will send a copy direct to Merv Featonby for his comments and will give about three copies to Dick Holmes for him to circulate around the Committee.

This draft is open to anyone to criticise or make suggestions for additions, corrections, deletions or improvements.

The Wongabel, Borneo section remains to be done and I will need assistance as I was not personally there. I will sketch out what I have from the war diaries and other material and again produce a draft for others to supply the detail.

The question of photos will also have to be considered. I have obtained a print out of photos held by the War Memorial in Canberra and Dick Holmes has offered his album but I am sure there are many other photos available which could be of interest.

Hoping to see you all on the 25th.

Don Ludlum has produced another piece of his war time writing. This one, written in humorous vein concerns POP COOK and was given to me last reunion by Don. In view of Pops death during the year it seems timely to publish an edited version of the original entitled POP AWAY AT THE WAR.

Life has been very easy for me the last few days because of a slight fever - this is my fifth day of a good restful "Bludge".

Now this has given Pop the chance of a century and he has been bombarding me with cheeky chirpy prattle every day about me 'cracking up'. But imagine how it must have dented his feelings yesterday when I found him on sick parade, lying flat out having his back massaged. I lost little time in putting forth a few remarks about his likeness to "UNCLE CLARENCE" and also volunteered to assist with both 'fists and Boots' but was shoved away with "Dry up LUDLUM, unless you want to get belted up again".

Now I don't know where he gets that 'again' business from unless it was some bravado dream of his, in which he was the 'bashing' hero. Anyway I didn't feel like letting it pass without comment, so, in spite of my terrible fever, took up the challenge with "Ok then, if that's the reason for you getting all trimmed up on the table there, well get up, put up yer dooks, and come in a-fighting". This stunned him, he hadn't expected me to take him up. His ruddy face become white-washed then turned green and finally showed 'yalla'. I had called his bluff.

But this set back was as usual very soon checked. On such occasions he brings all the shrewdness of a fox into action and his favourite way of getting out of these scrapes is to change the subject in a very clever manner. "Did I tell you" he starts off rather loudly for the benefit of those round about "about how I slew 40 Japs that time single handed"?
