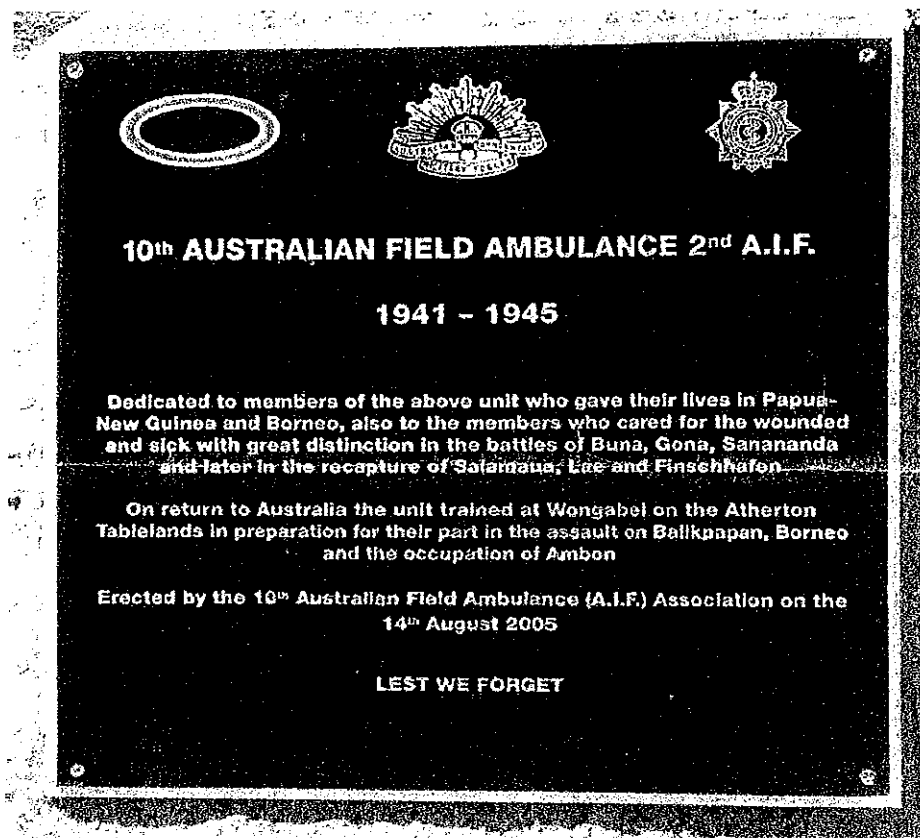

ANZAC Day Commemoration march 2006 – Guidelines for Unit Associations

Following discussion and agreement at Kindred Organisation and Unit Association (KO & UA) meetings in 2005, the following guidelines are issued for the assistance of unit associations.

These guidelines are designed to preserve the dignity of the day, the memory of the fallen and ensure as far as possible the march is completed within time-frames set down.

You will need to take responsibility on ANZAC Day for monitoring these guidelines, and whilst the marshals may be able to assist, be aware that their primary responsibility is to ensure the conduct of the March.

Please also note the neither you nor the marshals has the ability to evict people from the March. Diplomacy, and prior warning, are the keys.

1. Marchers should be neatly and respectfully attired. (Sporting pullovers, torn/dirty jeans and running shoes are not appreciated)
2. Descendents marching for deceased family member should be restricted to one member, extended families lengthens the march unreasonably. The deceased's medals should be worn on the right breast. Descendents should march at the rear of the assembled veterans.
3. Every effort should be made to keep in step with the band and other veterans. Remember, it is Commemoration March, not a Mardi gras.
4. Photos of deceased veterans carried by a descendent is not appropriate.

Please convey the above to members and descendents.

In accordance with a motion passed at the KO & UA meeting 12/12/05, ANZAC Day Staff will seek to have these matters included in the major daily newspapers in the days before ANZAC Day.

Minutes of the AGM 2004 Published In *Tit Bits* - On the motion of Lloyd Champion and David James, they were accepted as read.

Correspondence - Relative items have been covered by the committee and embraced in the text of the following reports.

10th *Tit Bits* - This most valuable medium for keeping members in contact with each other and the association has been prepared by Ron Woff over many years. Ron recorded his appreciation for the assistance of his family in the preparation, collation in quantity and mailing. Our thanks to Sarah Goode for her gem of a letter this year.

Treasurer's Report - Ken Stanley outlined the salient items of the financial statement for the calendar year 2004. In assuring the meeting that our finances are healthy, moved the acceptance of the report. Lloyd Champion in seconding the motion thanked Ken for the time and expertise he invests in the management of Association funds.

In summary: 1. Credit Balance \$4061.18
2. Surplus for year \$818.73

Ken also presented a budget for 2005, which indicated a deficit of \$800.00 and he advised that the committee had decided that the \$5 meal subsidy was no longer appropriate and will be discontinued.

Unit History - Ken advised of a stock of 43 History books held by our historian Les Williams and these are now on offer for \$20.00.

Welfare, Legacy, Memorabilia - Jack Bacon reported that matters appropriate to members are well documented in the media and recommended information be sought through the RSL and Veteran Affairs.

The annual grant to Legacy of \$100.00 was unanimously agreed on.

Membership - The enthusiasm for affiliate membership was most heartening and as of today there are 41 affiliate members and 27 affiliates are in attendance today.

Memorial Plaque at Atherton Tablelands - Ken Stanley reported that the wording on this plaque to be dedicated at Rocky Creek War Memorial Park, Tolga, Atherton Tablelands, has been resolved. A Commonwealth Government grant of \$500.00 has been received.

Long Service Awards - Inscribed plaques were presented to Ted Young and Ron Woff as thank you gestures for their long and dedicated service to the fellowship of the Association.

Toast to the Unit - Chairman Ted invited Ron Woff to propose the Unit toast and Ron in his relaxed and humorous style took us down memory lane to our training days, leisure times, and the satisfactions of medical caring in order not to lose the mood of Ron's oratory, his toast *verbatim* is produced attached.

General Business -

- (a) Looking to the future - Chairman Ted outlined the committee's concerns for the future and that there is now a blending of members and affiliates. The motion of Lloyd Champion and Ken Stanley that affiliate members be eligible to hold executive office was enthusiastically endorsed. Speaking to the motion suggestions from the floor were most encouraging, the concept of buddies working alongside office bearers and affiliates nominating talents they felt they could contribute were suggestions acted on at the meeting. This was a wonderful expression of the enthusiasm that has always been a feature of the Association.
- (b) Birthdays - Don Ludlum reported on a recent discussion he had with Stuart Smith that his birthday being this day contributed to his absence. Recognizing also the birthday of Alan Williams on the 24th. We collectively wished them ongoing health and happiness.

Meeting Close - As a 60th Anniversary this has been a special year and the mood of the reunion has been constant throughout our history. One of friendship, fellowship and happiness. Chairman, Vice President Ted Young, thanked everyone for their attendance and contribution to the day as he brought the formalities to a close.

TOAST TO THE UNIT by Ron Woff

Mr Vice President, members, affiliate members and guests. I want to start this toast to the unit by saying very sincerely that being transferred to the 10th FLD. AMB. was the best thing the army did for me during the war. An added bonus was the fact that my father survived World War 1 as a member of the original 10th FLD AMB. and my mother saw this as an omen that I would do the same. How did I get there – well it went something like this:

I was called up and told to report to the Brighton Drill hall in mid November 1941. One of my work mates had been drafted to a signals unit to go into camp at Williamstown on the 11th of December 1941 and as this sounded ok to me I asked to be drafted there. This was arranged but the manager of the insurance coy where I worked refused to let me go, as he hadn't received the one-month's notice he was entitled to.

I was then told to report on the 5th of January 1942. There was no direct transport to Brighton from where I lived in Mentone so I rode my bicycle to Sandringham then took the train to Brighton. One of the roads along which I rode just happened to be where my girl friend lived and she just happened to be waiting to say goodbye again – I am proud to say that she is now my wife of 59 years. We were sent to Royal Park for kit issue etc. and the next day entrained for Bonegilla. After three weeks infantry training I was drafted to the 4th field Ambulance. I was told that if you trained and became a nursing orderly you received an extra one-shilling a day pay so that is what I did. In March 1942 the unit traveled to Warwick in Queensland and at various intervals moved camp to Chermside sports ground (a Brisbane suburb) Beenleigh, Maryborough and then to the showgrounds at Nambour.

One night towards the end of October I was at a dance in Nambour when told to report back to camp and pack my gear ready for transfer to the 10th FLD. AMB. next morning. This was quite a surprise and rumors were flying thick and fast.

The rest is history – some 22 of us were taken to Landsborough and along with the rest of the 10th were paraded and placed under embarkation orders. We then watched a demonstration by Clem Winchester of how our gear was to be packed. The rest of you had already been issued jungle greens and had dyed your webbing green but we had to set about doing it right away. The webbing had not properly dried when we had to pack our things in it and move out early next morning. Needless to say some of our gear was tinged with green – my underwear for instance – once white was now camouflaged! The one consolation was that the jungle greens were a perfect fit.... But I'm not sure for what!!

Noel Smith and I traveled down to Brisbane in the back of an ambulance with Capt. Spring and Jack Trembath. This gave us a chance to explain our training to date and probably led to Noel and I working in the operating theatre of the 2/9 AGH at Moresby and later in the surgical team with Capt. Spring at Soputa. I traveled to NewGuinea in the S.S. Both and whilst in the Harbour at Moresby, still on board we experienced our 1st air raid. So this was war!

I once read war defined as being "Long periods of boredom interrupted by short periods of fright".

Well we had our short periods of fright but were lucky in not having, in my opinion, long periods of boredom. This was because we were nearly always engaged in worthwhile activities, running hospitals, evacuating patients and all the necessary things associated therewith – incidentally – the records show that we did this rather well. How did we fill our time on the few occasions we were not so occupied? The main example was Wongabel on the Queensland tablelands. And what a pleasant time that was.

Those many routes marches to Lake Eacham, Lake Barrine and Milanda falls where we would spend the rest of the day swimming, lazing in the sun – our lunch brought out to us - then after more swimming etc. we were driven back to camp – what a hard boring life that was.

At camp the amenities were good and leave into Atherton for pictures, church etc was frequent.

The tablelands was noted for its cabinet timbers and our unit carpenter 'Pedro' Hunt was always in demand to assist the many 'would be' carpenters to use these lovely timbers to make things – particularly trays – there is still the remnants of one of my creations at home.

Then there was sport which encompassed cricket, football, basketball, athletics and table tennis.

Our football jumpers were a lovely powder blue crewneck design, nothing like Aussie rules jumpers and one match stands out in my memory. We were playing a team from a Commando Company whose jumpers were a bright canary yellow. Rather unsuitable for them. The ground we played on was well grassed but as the grass was mainly dead it was slippery and we had great difficulty in keeping our feet as we were playing in army boots without any stops. This frustrated Tac Grundy to the extent that he took off his boots and socks and played in bare feet. It was a brave act and he was the star of the game.

Table tennis was well catered for and we had some rather good players. I could not let this occasion pass without once more recalling the night when we won the championship of the tablelands which included that famous match when Bob Crawford beat John Bromwich – that was a very proud night for us and the unit.

Cricket. I wasn't a good enough cricketer to make the unit team but enjoyed the inter-company matches and remember stars like Lloyd Champion, Alan Sharp, Ken Stanley and Bill Lynskey with his googly bowling.

Apart from sport, route marches, swimming, hobbies etc we made the campsite quite a showpiece set off by the front fence of interwoven lawyervines. I'm sure there must have been a few machetes lost in the tropical undergrowth during the cutting down of all the necessary vines.

"Anti boredom" activities at other places included butterfly hunting and collecting, particularly at Oro Bay. Kowrie Shell collecting at Balikpapan and the ubiquitous sport of "Baddington". Add to these, picture shows,

concerts and letter writing – and you will remember all the good times hence my conclusion that we were a lucky unit.

One or two personal items which may be of interest. I was with the group led by Capt. Wilson which trekked from Oro Bay to Soputa via Dobodura. To take over the M.D.S there. It took the best part of two days and conditions were trying. The first night was spent at Dobodura and on the second day Noel Smith and I fell behind after stopping for a swim along the way. We were trying to catch up when we were overtaken by a party of Boongs (N.G. natives) who agreed to carry our packs in exchange for some tobacco. A little later on we caught up the main party who were having a rest, Capt. Wilson told us to keep going. Sometime later we arrived at the M.D.S and were accosted by Colonel – later Brigadier Kingsley Norris demanding to know why the rest of our group wasn't with us – being a real wise guy I told him, quite proudly, that we got some Boongs to carry our gear for us – expecting some sort of praise – instead he glared at us and said "I carried my own gear all the way over the Owen Stanleys" – so much for initiative! - Sense of humour by pass.

Over the years we have heard how various members spent their 21st birthdays. I remember mine for this incident – we were at Lae on the banks of the Butibum River and during the afternoon we had an emergency appendix operation. Capt. Spring was operating and Laurie Malkin and I were assisting. When I mentioned that it was my 21st Capt. Spring said that he would let me see if I could go in and find the appendix as a birthday present. I managed this some how but of course he finished the op. and all went well.

'My time in the Navy' After the war ended we went from Balikpapan to Ambon and set up in the Dutch Hospital. The sick berth attendant of the HMAS Broome injured his leg and I was asked to take his place as this Corvette was going off on a 10 day tour of inspection of some of the Spice Islands, the purpose being to make sure there were no Jap stragglers left there.

Fortunately the sea was like glass – flying fish in abundance and sunrises and sun sets like a Fitzpatrick travelogue – it was a real tourist cruise. We visited the Islands of Kai, Arrau, Tannibar and Banda, I went ashore with the Naval party and – no Japs were found, but I did some trading with the locals swapping tins of talcum powder for various items. On the way back to Ambon it was decided to go fishing – this was done by means of depth charge (I don't know what that cost) anyway the five huge fish which came to the surface were sufficient to feed the whole crew. Sounds rather biblical doesn't it? It certainly made the escapades of our Jones brothers at Morobe using hand grenades seem like 'small fry'. Enough for now.

I will always be proud and grateful that I was a member of the 10th and ask you all to be upstanding and drink a toast to the 10th Field Ambulance.

PRESENTATION FOR TED

As mentioned in the minutes Ted Young was presented with a plaque in recognition of his services to our association. The following is the presentation speech by Secretary Dick Holmes.

It is my pleasure and privilege to make a presentation today to Ted. Before I do, there are a few points I want to make concerning Ted's very interesting years prior to and during his years in the 10th Field Ambulance.

Firstly, his mother said NO when he wanted to join the Army at 16 years of age! Then at 18, he like so many of us was called up and went to Boystown which he probably enjoyed!

Ted was one of 3 "Young's" in the 10th. There was driver Bruce, who drove many of us in seat-less 3 ton trucks. Then there was Ron who liked Ted was too young to go overseas so the two were sent back from QLD to VIC. That left one Young.

After a while, Ted approached the C.O. and said that he didn't want to be in an ambulance unit but the C.O. said "son, you're mine and you're going to stay". Ted we're glad you did.

One day Ted thought he would do the disappearing trick but unfortunately for him he got caught. On being paraded in front of the C.O. he was told "you can't buck John Bull". Ted became very popular with the C.O.

Some time later and no longer too young, Ted was again drafted to the 10th so now we're back to two Young's whilst Ron Young couldn't rejoin us because he was still too young. So we finished up with two Young's who were not too young and the C.O. was happy!

Today we miss our wonderful President but I'm sure all of us have noticed year after year the appreciation President Dunn has shown for the support Ted has given him.

On behalf of the President and all the 10th F.A., this plaque is presented to you for your wonderful years and the hope of many more to come.

A real nostalgic trip for me refreshing memories of air evacuation days and my first ever flight with a P.I. soldier from DREGAR to LAE. Flash seats with small TV screens and hostess serving refreshments was in stark contrast with the unlined cavernous hulk bodies, pilots open to the cargo hold and passengers seating as panel sections hinged to the walls. The return flight continues as a vivid memory for me with 12 passengers sharing a load of mail the pilots pulled out of one take off part way along the runway with concerns about getting the tail off the ground. To redistribute the weight we passengers were invited to huddle together on top of the mail bags with the pilot saying "I will go further back up the strip and make a longer run at it". With the LAE strip terminating abruptly over a cliff to the sea, for me this was an invitation to a long swim. Fortunately it all resolved as misplaced fear. These are other memories of flights of DC3 landing on the earth strip at DOBODURA and lining up like taxis facing the strip to be unloaded and reloaded with our patients ready for take-off similarly at LAE and DREGAR.
