We hear of **<u>sacrifice</u>** – the cost of life

Of their experiences – both good and bad

Remember they went away as 18 / 19 year olds and spent the next 4 to 5 years away

We have never done that -

I cannot think of what is was like

The word sacrifice

Immediately we think of - the sacrifice of life

I look at my father and his mates within the unit

The sacrifice that I see

Is the sacrifice of their youth

We are all extremely grateful for the commitment of every serving member

To their country To their family

Their families shared in their sacrifice

Today we all map out our lives To 18 we attend secondary college – determining what course - our direction in life From 19 to 23 we go to university And the life of a Uni student – we all remember WOW – some things we can tell our parents – And the other things - well !!!!!! – We all know the other things I look at dad and all his mates - I see great guys all who all missed this stage of their lives They lost their youth But for these great guys it is what they had to do As a young boy And we are always young

I witnessed the sacrifices that every unit member endured For me – the stories of how good a cricketer dad was – But not able to play district cricket – his dream growing up He was provided with a cricket scholarship at the age of 17 An opportunity to start his sporting career to play district cricket Those budding young cricketers – One also by the name of Alan Sharp

Dad met Alan thru cricket at the age of 18 And when they met again It was on a different field For dad and Alan not to realise their dreams – Could they have played test cricket - they had hopes It was not to be Following that war they had to rebuild their lives Their lives started in their mid 20s Rebuilding personal relationships Study at Night school Work Family Bloody hell – I don't think I could have done that

<u>Mateship</u>

What I have grown to understand thru listening to the stories – and the times There was a strong bond – a strong bond of **mateship** We see the real meaning of mateship – every day we see these guys together From the origins of ANZAC – in 1915 Our soldiers embodied the commitment of freedom In part a strange spirit of adventure From our knock about nature This bond of mateship We hold this dearly to this day They had reliance on each other It was them and them only There was something very special that came from this horrible mess – this war We see lifelong friendships

Since I can remember it was always a very special day when we shared family days There were the days with Alan Sharp and wife Pat A Queens Birthday yearly event with Clem Winchester and wife June Clem Alan Ken - They were real mates Just look at this picture of mum and dads wedding – All three mates side by side

At our family days we would sit and listen to the stories – all those memories They shared experiences that we would struggle to comprehend But their bond of mateship got them thru This unique bond - a bond that tied them together for life And it supported them all

They all supported each other – thru adversity to their return to normal life A few years back I presented the toast on behalf of dad –

That was his last reunion lunch

The last words of that toast I would like to share with you again

I feel they are very special and reflect why we are here

Special words

It is inevitable, time and illness have taken their toll

We remember those very fine men who have now passed on

PREPARATION OF "TENTH TIT BITS"



WORLD WAR 1 - 10th AUSTRALIAN FIELD AMBULANCE

Following the publication in recent years of the Units WW 11 history "Care, Courage and Camaraderie", a war historian, James Anderson, has authored "A Record of the 10th Australian Field Ambulance in World War 1".

The internet sourced summary of the book begins as follows :

"......What did you do in the war grandpa ?"

This was not a question to which many people got a satisfactory answer, such answers were often too painful to give. For those that did ask, many did not have the life-experience to understand the answers.

Members /Affiliates will find the book adds to and enhances the Units history and story as expressed in 'Care, Courage and Camaraderie"

In conducting his research for the book the author consulted with Ron Woff and his granddaughter Torey Fitton as Rons father Val (Valentine Woff) was a member of the WW1 Unit . There are several references to and pictures of Val in the book.
